Nominations open for Bunnings Home Ground Heroes – celebrating local Touch legends

Bunnings and Touch New Zealand are once again calling on the Touch community to nominate a 'Home Ground Hero' who goes above and beyond the call of duty in support of the game. The initiative celebrates unsung heroes who ensure players get to games, kits are ready, and tournaments run smoothly. Five recipients are selected each year and receive \$5,000 to invest into their Touch community.

Steve 'Huddy' Hudson was honoured as one of five Home Ground Heroes in 2024 for his commitment to Rotorua Touch. Hudson discovered Touch when he was 16 and is now involved in every facet of the game. He plays, trains junior referees, and is currently preparing to compete in the upcoming Bunnings Masters Championships in Christchurch this March.

Noelani Hudson, Steve's wife, says, "Steve believes the Touch community is not just a sports team – it's your family and you look after your family on and off the field."

Hudson's dedication has fuelled Touch's growth in Rotorua, growing from 120 teams to more than 220 over the past six years. Hudson's \$5,000 grant has enabled him to contribute more to Rotorua Touch, providing teams with uniforms as well as financing a free school holiday programme to teach local Tamariki basic ball skills and introduce them to the sport he loves.

Joe Sprangers, Touch NZ Chief Executive says, "Home Ground Heroes provides a meaningful way to acknowledge those in our Touch community who give back to the sport we love, making it possible for us all to enjoy.

"We are grateful to celebrate another year in partnership with Bunnings, who work alongside us to grow the game and honour those in our community who are doing the mahi".

Melissa Haines, Bunnings NZ General Manager says, "We are looking forward to celebrating another group of Touch heroes who make a positive difference to their community. Many of our team members play touch and are volunteers





or spectators themselves and understand the vital role that these heroes play. Recognising them is our way of backing local".

Now in its fourth year, Bunnings Home Ground Heroes has celebrated 15 Touch legends from across Aotearoa. To enter, nominators will need to demonstrate how their nominee makes a positive impact the wider Touch community. They will also need to explain how \$5,000 would be used to further their efforts in the Touch community.


