

Dutch Iris are easy to grow with very low maintenance. They can be left in the ground for continual year after year flowering.

But don't just enjoy these outside they also make a wonderful cut flower for a fabulous display inside. They prefer a full sun position in well drained soil. Late spring flowering.

OUBLE FREESIAS



Double Freesias have an extra row of petals within each flower. Double Freesias make beautifully scented cut flowers and are perfect for pots and containers.

Freesias are very easy to grow and perfect for naturalising. Simply select a well drained soil and plant and forget. Prefers a full sun to part shade position and are ideal for pots and containers. Mid season flowering.

ONÓNITS



Jonquils flower better in warmer climates than Daffodils. They will generally only flower from round mature bulbs.

If you plant them too shallow they are prone to 'split up' into side bulbs too readily to reach maturity. Deeper planted bulbs appear to stay healthier, and split less frequently, thus producing more flowers for many years.

USCARI MIXED



Muscari Mixed is a mixture of double blue, light blue, single blue and white Muscari that will look great on its own or mass planted as part of a bigger garden scheme of complementing colours.

Muscari are a carefree plant and forget style bulb. Ideal for potted colour, creating borders or naturalising under trees, they multiply well and are prolific flowering. Hardy, drought tolerant and easy to grow. Early spring flowering.

SCILLA



Scilla is hardy bulb will produce tall flower spikes with many tiny blue star shaped flowers. Will not flower in rich soil, this tough performer grows and flowers best in very poor gravelly soil with very little water or fertiliser, making it perfect for that difficult spot in the garden.

Makes a terrific cut flower as the flowers continue to open over a long period of time.Prefers a full sun to part shade position. Mid-spring flowering.

TULIPS



Tulips have vibrant colours, large blooms and strong tall stems, along with a perfect triangular shape when closed. This makes them the most popular cut flower variety. Tulips prefer a full sun to part shade position and are ideal for pots and containers.

Plant the bulbs when the ground begins to cool in late April – May if required place the bulbs in the crisper in aerated plastic or paper bags (away from fruit) 4-6 weeks prior to planting. Flowers mid – late spring. Mid season flowering.

IUMPH TULIPS



Triumph Tulips are hardy and very reliable, long lasting flowers in the widest of colour range, the Triumph's are every gardeners favourite. Tulips prefer a full sun to part shade position and are ideal for pots and containers.

Plant the bulbs when the ground begins to cool in late April – May if required place the bulbs in the crisper in aerated plastic or paper bags (away from fruit) 4-6 weeks prior to planting. Flowers mid to late spring. Mid-season flowering

ROCUS



Crocus these beautiful bulbs are sure to brighten up your late Winter garden beds or pots. Ideally suited to naturalising in cooler climates, they are easy to grow even in areas that do not have a cold Winter.

A chilling period of 6 weeks before planting is recommended in mild Winter climates. Crocus make a magnificent show in window boxes and flowerpots. Flowers emerge before the fine grassy foliage so they are perfect for naturalising in lawn areas as well.

AFFODIL ICE KING



Daffodil Ice King has pretty all-over creamy yellow flowers with tightly ruffled centres. Double Daffodils add a delightful charm to the garden double layers of petals. Leave in the ground year after year and the bulbs will multiply.

Excellent as a cut flower to bring Spring indoors, Daffodils look great when planted under trees. Better suited to the cooler climates; best treated as an annual in areas that do not get a cold Winter or have a short hot Spring.
